POLICY ON EARLY EDUCATION FUNDING

15 hours Universal entitlement

All 3 and 4-year-olds in England are entitled to 570 hours of free early education or childcare a year. Nursery providers can deliver this funding across the school terms (15 hours per week for 38 weeks per year) or by stretching it to cover a longer period of the year.

Brook House Nursery stretches the funding over 51 weeks.

We apply a charge for any additional hours outside of the funded hours, as detailed in the Fee Schedule.

When is my child eligible for funding?

You can start claiming universal entitlement after your child turns 3 if you meet the eligibility criteria. The date you can claim will depend on when their birthday is.

Child's birthday	When you can claim
1 st January to 31 st March	the beginning of term on or after 1 st April
1 st April to 31 st August	the beginning of term on or after 1 st September
1 st September to 31 st December	the beginning of term on or after 1 st January

Example: If your child was born on 16 February 2021. They'll become eligible for free early education and childcare from the start of term following 1 April 2024.

Funding will follow the child across the term.

Funding will be claimed for the weeks the child is on roll, the place is available to access and attendance has started.

Claims will be made based on child on roll, and weeks the place is available to access. Families can change providers or hours during term and still access their entitlement.

How do I apply?

The nursery will contact parents of all eligible children and request that the parents complete, sign and return a parent funding authorisation form, that will be used to claim the funding.

30 hours Extended entitlement

The government also offers extra 15 (extended) hours a week of funded childcare, to working parents of 3 and 4 year olds, who meet the eligibility criteria.

Currently, Brook House Nursery offers extended hours for families whose children attend the setting for 4 or 5 days per week.



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ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA:

- **WORK REQUIREMENTS** - Parents must earn or expect to earn the equivalent to 16 hours at National Minimum or Living Wage over the coming three months. Where a parent is in a 'start-up period' (i.e. they are newly self-employed) they do not need to demonstrate that they meet the income criteria for 12 months.
- **SALARY** - Parents must earn or expect to earn the equivalent to 16 hours at National Minimum or Living Wage over the coming three months. This equates to £120 a week for each parent over 25 years old or £112.80 a week for each parent between 21 and 24 years old and £56 a week for apprentices in their first year. You can't get 30 hours free childcare if you, or your partner, expect to earn £100,000 or more.
- **AGE OF CHILDREN** - Your child/children must be either 3 or 4 years old. You can apply for funding in the term prior to your child's 3rd birthday but the funding will not apply until the term after they turn 3.
- **LOCATION** - This offer is for working families in England. If one or both parents is a non-EEA national, the parent applying must have recourse to public funds. If one or both parents is a non-EEA national and the parent applying does not have recourse to public funds, you will not be eligible.

30 hours - when to apply for a code?

You can apply from when your child is 2 years and 36 weeks old. Please visit the following website to apply for 30 hours childcare:

You'll need your details (and your partner's, if you have one), including your:

- National Insurance number
- Unique Taxpayer Reference (UTR), if you're self-employed

If you pay for childcare and want to use Tax-Free Childcare to get help with costs, you can also apply using this service. It usually takes 20 minutes to apply. You may find out if you're eligible straight away, but it can take up to 7 days.

Recommended time for parents to apply for the code:

When your child's turn 3	When they can get 30 hours from	Recommended time to apply
1st September to 31st December	Term starting on or after 1st January	15th October to 30th November
1st January to 31st March	Term starting on or after 1st April	15th January to 28th February
1st April to 31st August	Term starting on or after 1st September	15th June to 31st July

Remember you need to reconfirm your eligibility code every 3 months.



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What happens to my funding if my child leaves the nursery during the term

- A maximum of a 4 weeks notice period should be given to the nursery in writing. A leavers form will be provided by the nursery.
- Whole weeks of funding can be claimed up to the week in which notice period ends.
- Leavers form, signed by parents, and the original written notice is evidence of the leavers' claim.

2 year old funding

The Department of Education has confirmed that from 2 January 2024, eligible working parents can apply for 15 hours of childcare for their two-year-old.

Parents have until 31 March 2024 to apply for a code, with mid-January to the end of February being the optimum time to apply in case they need to provide further information to support their application. It is advisable to apply between 15 January and 15 February 2024.

To apply for a childcare code each parent needs to be working and earning the equivalent of 16 hours a week at national minimum/living wage and under £100,000 adjusted net income per year. This means that each parent needs to earn from just over £8,600 per year to be eligible for 15 hours a week of childcare during term time.
